Trip to Pilsen

On April 10, the Spanish III class, along with the AP Spanish class, went on a field trip to Pilsen, Chicago's largest Hispanic neighborhood. We took a tour of the neighborhood which featured many beautiful murals. Each mural has a different purpose. As our tour guide, a resident of Pilsen, explained: "The murals are not just for decoration; they have meaning." For instance, some of the murals honored different groups of people including women, African Americans, and the residents of Pilsen. We looked at some murals featuring the history of Mexico meant to teach children about their culture so that they "know who they are."

We also visited a school for children in a gifted program in which English is slowly integrated into the curriculum. The children must maintain good grades and polite manners. One school official noted that, "if they roll their eyes at authoritative figures, their mother gets called." We then went to the Mexican Art Museum where we visited one of its four exhibits called "Mexiconidad: Our Past is Present." The exhibit is a trip through the different stages of Mexican history beginning with a work of art displaying Our Lady of Guadalupe, or the Virgin Mary. Another work of art was a huge beaded design made of over 2 million beads! The art, like the murals outside, had deep meaning and honored Mexican history and religion. As our tour guide told us, faith was one of the few things that the people of Mexico, during the hard times, could take with them, and it is reflected in the art.

Our tour ended with the message, "If you forget everything else about Pilsen, just know that we appreciate art." We finished the day with a trip to an authentic Mexican restaurant. Overall, it was a very enjoyable day and everyone learned a lot.



Illinois Studies Visits the Pontiac War Museum

Sports: Introducing Mr. Anthony Davis

John Calipari, head coach of the Kentucky Wildcats, is known for his "one and done" recruiting system. This system has been used since the NBA has stopped letting players enter the NBA straight out of high school. Anthony Davis is projected to be the first overall pick in the NBA Draft. This would make Davis the third Calipari recruit to be selected first overall in the past 5 years (2008: Derrick Rose, 2010: John Wall).

Anthony Davis was locally unknown through his years of high school. A "late bloomer", Anthony hit a growth spurt in the spring of his junior year. This prompted him into signing up for AAU basketball where he earned nationwide recognition. Within months, Davis was the top rated player in the national class of 2011 by *ESPN.com*. Anthony started freshman year as a 6'1" guard and graduated senior year as a 6'10" center, growing 3 inches each year as he continued to mature.

After signing a National Letter of Intent to attend the University of Kentucky, ESPN sportscaster Dick Vitale mentioned the possibility that "Davis might complete the men's college basketball awards Grand Slam of National Player of the Year, Defensive Player of the Year, Freshman of the Year, and the No. 1 overall pick in the upcoming draft." Davis helped lead the Wildcats to a 36-2 record, earning them a one seed in the March Madness Tournament. Kentucky has shown why they were the favorite to win the championship, cruising to national champs while defeating all opponents by double digits in the tournament (besides runner-up Kansas who lost by 8).

After complete and utter domination over opponents in the NCAA this year, Davis has made his mark in history. He has not only shown the ability to compete at the collegiate level, but that he has what it takes to play at the professional level. Davis is a great example to how the "one and done" system can be successful. Expect to see Anthony Davis in the headlines soon as he continues to make others "bow to the brow."

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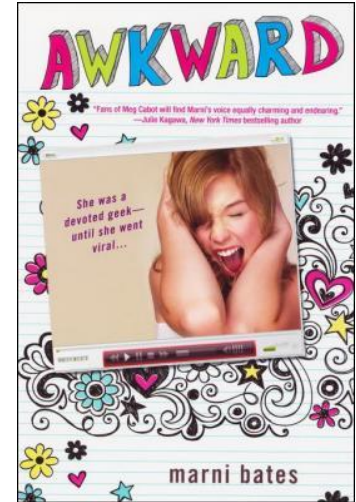
Book Review: *Awkward* Marni Bates

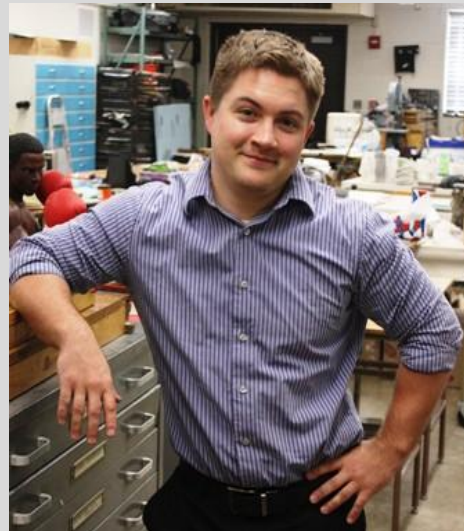
Mr. Sorowski
